### WEEK IN REVIEW 6/3/2025

Location: Pensacola Yacht Club

Date: 3 June 2025

Attendance: Approximately 74 members and guests

Past President Charles Beall called the meeting to order and led the membership in reciting the Four-Way Test. Rotarian Innes Richards offered the invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### Program:

Rotarian Olevia McNally introduced the guest speaker, Sue Straughn. She has been a cornerstone of Channel 3 News since 1973. She began her career as a clerk typist and worked her way up to become a Senior News Anchor. Viewers can see her regularly on Channel 3 at 11 AM, 5 PM, and 6 PM. Known as the heart of the community, Sue is deeply involved in numerous local organizations including the ARC Gateway-Escambia County Child Development Committee, Autism Pensacola Board of Directors, BRACE, Covenant Hospice Foundation Board, Sacred Heart Hospital Advisory Board, and the American Red Cross Board of Directors, among many others. She is also the founder of Communities Caring at Christmas, a beloved holiday initiative in the region. Sue has been recognized with multiple honors, including being named one of the 100 Most Influential People by INWeekly, one of the 10 Most Influential People by Climate Magazine, the Martin Luther King Jr. "Living the Dream" Award, and Ambassador for Education by the Escambia County Public Schools Foundation. When she's not serving the community or reporting the news, Sue enjoys reading.

Sue Straughn began her presentation by highlighting the importance of diversity in the newsroom—not just in backgrounds, but also in perspectives. While young reporters bring fresh ideas and energy, they often lack a historical understanding of the local community. Sue noted that it used to be typical for reporters in the Pensacola market to be in their third or fourth job. Now, many are coming directly out of school, a shift that was once unimaginable. This change can lead to small but telling errors, like incorrect road names, though it also fosters innovation and prevents the newsroom from becoming an echo chamber.

She described the newsroom's editorial meetings, held daily at 9:30 AM, where staff discuss what happened overnight, decisions from city council or county commission meetings, and statements from local leaders. Sue remembered a former colleague, Dan Shugart, who served as both the station's historian and sportscaster and added valuable perspective to editorial decisions.

Sue emphasized the newsroom's commitment to accuracy. She shared an example of a recent helicopter incident in Santa Rosa County that was inaccurately reported as a "crash" due to wording in a 911 call. Although the situation was a "hard landing," the word "crash" made its way into the story. The comment section was filled with feedback from pilots who corrected the terminology, illustrating how carefully the public watches. Sue encouraged community members to speak up if something seems inaccurate, saying, "Please let your voices be heard," and inviting people to call the news director or herself directly.

Known for her compassionate reporting, Sue shared how segments like Angels in Our Midst—while not always popular—can be deeply impactful. She asked the audience to clearly label story ideas in email subject lines and follow up by phone, as the newsroom receives hundreds of pitches each day.

Sue also addressed challenges facing journalism today. In response to a question about why so many reporters are now in their first job in the Pensacola Market, she cited low salaries. She pushed back on claims of liberal media bias, pointing out that Sinclair Broadcasting, the parent company of Channel 3, is "anything but...". She noted that some nationally syndicated "franchise" stories are required across Sinclair stations.

Sue shared a serious personal experience from January 6, when a man phoned her after hearing her story. He threatened her life and indicated he knew where she lived as he had been working on her air conditioning unit. The situation required police intervention, highlighting the real-life risks journalists sometimes face.

When asked by the former Mayor, Grover Robinson, to compare Pensacola's past and present, Sue **expressed concern** about Escambia County's progress in **education and economic development**. She voiced hope that the community could come together to address these challenges and pointed to promising developments in Santa Rosa and Okaloosa Counties.

Dr. Judy Bense asked if Sue had ever had a story she strongly believed in canceled. Sue said no.

Charles Beall closed the meeting by thanking Sue for her consistent service and dedication. He remarked on the value of Channel 3's continuity in the community and honored Sue as a Paul Harris Fellow, recognizing her longstanding service as a member of the Five Flags Rotary Club.
